Webs & Roots: Talk About Networking!

Every spring, for twenty-two years, the Wings Over the Rockies Festival has offered unique insights into our special place on the planet, the Upper Columbia Valley

This year's theme, Webs & Roots: Talk About Networking! is inspired by the research of our 2018 keynote presenter renowned forest ecologist Suzanne Simard.

We seldom think about forests. When we smell the scent of forests we might remember that trees are the lungs of the planet, breathing in CO2 and exhaling the oxygen. But really, trees are the boring upright and rigid members of much more dynamic ecosystems that include flowers, insects, birds and wildlife. Recently scientists have discovered that there is a hidden side to forests. Beneath the forest's floor, roots and fungus are exchanging


nutrients and messages between trees. These hidden communication networks are vital to forest health.

Like a forest, the Wings festival also relies on complex networks to develop its engaging events. These networks include the flora and fauna of the upper Columbia Valley, expert presenters, our event planner, the many volunteers and sponsors, and you, our festival participants. Together we create the magic that is the Wings Over the Rockies Festival.

Columbia Wetlands Waterbird Survey



Pat and Baiba Morrow Mountaineers, photojournalists and filmmakers, the Morrows are regular Wings participants and presenters.

The Royal Canadian Geographical Society recently awarded the mountaineering duo Baiba and Pat Morrow with the Sir Christopher Ondaatje Medal for Exploration. Baiba and Pat Morrow have dedicated their professional and personal lives to the discovery and documentation of the world's physical and human landscapes, beginning right here with the stunning ecosystem in the Columbia Valley.

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Pat Morrow is recognized internationally for being the second Canadian to stand on the summit of Mount Everest, and the first person to have completed the Seven Summits project. His book, Beyond Everest: Quest for the Seven Summits, has earned him recognition as both an adventurer and a filmmaker. In 1988, he received the Order of Canada, and in 1990, he was recognized with the Summit of Excellence at the Banff Mountain Film Festival.





If Bees Are Few

As part of a themed Art Show at Pynelogs Art Gallery there will be several artists celebrating the awe that one feels in the presence of these social insects, to the astounding service of the honeybee and to the fears that are growing about the risks that they face.

There is so much to explore on their theme: the awe at the intelligent behaviour of the hive and its perfect social organization, the seemingly altruistic devotion of the worker bees to its duty, the weighty role of the queen as mother of all and the absolute beauty of the honeybee itself.

To complete the 'bee' show, the artwork from the Lil Peeps artists (Columbia Valley Daycare Centre kids) will fill the Gallery with cute, fuzzy, creative beeeeezzzz. The Gallery will also feature our local artist community with their interpretation of the theme. So for the week of the Wings Over the Rockies Festival, the Pynelogs Art Gallery will beeee abuzz with artwork, people networking about Webs & Roots and many lively discussions about the Flower Sex & Bee Conversations (Evening Presentation on Friday May 11th at 7 pm hosted by Kathryn Manry)!



Nest Webs: Tree-cavity Housing Networks for Forest Wildlife with Kathy Martin (Evening Presentation)

About one in five birds use cavities in trees year-round for nesting and roosting globally. Tree-cavity-using wildlife communities occur in "nest webs", whereby woodpeckers and nuthatches excavate cavities, and over the next several decades, individual cavities can be used many times by multiple non-excavator species (ducks, owls).

Searching for Tao Canyon

A stunning AV presentation of retro, mind-bending photography that unlocks a hidden world of natural wonder, personal reflection and outdoor adventure.

One of the world's most exotic landscapes lies just a 20-hour drive from Invermere. Across the high desert of Utah and northern Arizona stretches a labyrinthine connectivity of slot canyons — narrow, deep, often overhanging and fantastically carved.

For over a decade, beginning in 1975, Art Twomey, Pat Morrow and Jeremy Schmidt inadvertently helped pioneer the sport of canyoneering. Using jury-

rigged climbing and caving techniques, they hauled their cameras through the wildest, most intricate canyons they could find. At the time, slot canyons were virtually unknown, their exquisite beauties not yet appreciated. There were no guidebooks, no guided tours, no satellite images to work from. The pleasure came from old-fashioned exploration and a sense of discovery, of finding places no one knew.



The direct ancestor of our house cats is likely the African wild cat, F. libyca. The cat, as we know it, was only fully domesticated during the last 150 years. Based on figures gleaned from the literature, there are now well over 150 million pet cats in the world. The number of feral cats is not really known. Roughly half of owned pet cats run free outdoors. While not all pet cats hunt birds, many of them do, even if well fed. A very conservative estimate is that close to two billion birds are killed by pet cats all over the world each year! Needless to say, it has been no easy task to convince cat-owners to keep their pets indoors and the subject has pitted animal-lovers squarely against one another, sometimes quite fiercely. It is critical that the two sides at least maintain a dialogue with one another to find a solution that is palatable for all. This visual presentation by Dr. David Bird attempts to do just that.




Grassroots Groundwater Initiatives in the Columbia Basin and Beyond

The wetlands and surface waters that birds depend on are only one storage compartment for water as it cycles through our atmosphere, soil, rivers, lakes, and oceans. Across the world we are seeing grassroots efforts to help protect our waters— for human use and to support healthy ecosystems.

In the Columbia Basin, groundwater is important for contributing to base flows in rivers. Living Lakes Canada is a grassroots organization that is monitoring groundwater levels in the Basin to provide data that will help manage and protect groundwater resources. This work supports the recommendations in the Columbia Basin Trust's report on water monitoring and climate change, which concluded that more information is needed to effectively manage water resources across the Basin's different hydrologic regions.

Another example of a grassroots groundwater initiative is a project that was coordinated by Paul Bauman in Uganda with the Society of Exploration Geophysicists, the Geoscientists Without Borders Foundation, and IsraAID. Local Acholi people, whose homes and water systems had been destroyed during a 22-year insurgency, were trained in water exploration, manual drilling, and hand-pump repair and installation.

Living Lakes and Paul are excited to be a part of this year's Festival as we explore the interconnectedness of our ecosystems- including groundwater.

Tree cavities – a vital wildlife habitat



OVER 1,000 BIRD species, and many mammals, amphibians and reptiles worldwide depend on using tree cavities for nesting and shelter. In interior British Columbia, about 25% of forest birds and mammals use tree cavities to conduct their critical life activities. Tree cavities can be formed by excavation or decay. Some cavity-dependent species are able to excavate their own holes in trees. In other situations the normal decay processes in senescing trees gradually form holes, some of which are suitable for nesting and roosting. Cavityusing species are classified into three guilds according to how they acquire cavities. Woodpeckers, nuthatches and some chickadees are primary excavators that create cavities in trees. Secondary cavity nesters include a variety of songbirds, ducks (yes, some ducks nest in tree holes!), birds of prey, and medium-sized mammals that use but cannot excavate cavities. Thus, they rely on cavities created by excavators or decay. A third guild, weak excavators, may excavate their own cavities in decayed trees or use existing decay-formed or excavated cavities. Dr Kathy Martin (Department of Forest Sciences) coined the term Nest Web to describe the inter-dependence among the three groups with respect to the creation and use of nesting and roosting tree cavities. Nest Web wildlife communities occur on all continents except the Antarctic where there are no trees.

Woodpeckers and Aspen

When Kathy Martin started her research on cavity-nesting verte-

brates in interior British Columbia 17 years ago, it was immediately obvious to her that aspen, especially decayed trees, were a very important resource for cavity nesters. Although aspen comprised only 15% of the trees in her study sites, over 95% of the 4,850 nests of 32 species of cavity-using birds and mammals were found in aspen. In British Columbia, about 90% of secondary cavity nesters use excavated cavities, with the rest in decay-formed holes. The northern flicker is the most important of the 10 excavating species at Kathy's sites because it is abundant and produces many medium to large-sized cavities that can be used by species ranging from bluebirds and swallows to squirrels and ducks. The less abundant pileated woodpecker provides large long-lasting cavities for owls, kestrels, goldeneye, pine marten, and fisher. Woodpeckers prefer to excavate cavities in trees that are still alive but unhealthy with some internal decay or damage, but aspen that are recently dead and those with advanced decay are frequently used. To support cavitydependent wildlife communities, it is important to keep aspen in a range of conditions, especially live unhealthy aspen (hard trees with soft spots of decay) and dead trees.

Woodpecker Legacies

Woodpeckers can produce several cavities annually but use each cavity only once for nesting. Since tree cavities can last for 10 to 15 years or longer, these cavities are available for over 30 other species to use. Kathy Martin's research group followed the lives of tree cavities and

found that a cavity over its lifetime may be used by such different species as flickers, red squirrels, northern flying squirrels, saw-whet owls, kestrels, tree swallows, chickadees, and several duck species. One cavity was used 17 times in 13 years (cavities can be re-used sequentially in the same year). In North America, woodpeckers are often considered to be a keystone species or an ecosystem architect because they form high quality tree cavities that are suitable for use by many cavityusing vertebrates. Kathy's research group discovered that woodpeckers are excellent indicators of biodiversity as forest stands with many woodpeckers generally also have high avian biodiversity.

Decay Legacies

Kathy and her research group have also looked at the use of excavated and non-excavated cavities and at cavity persistence across continents. They found striking differences among regions. In North America, woodpeckers were responsible for a large proportion of functional cavities, and both excavated and decay-formed cavities had a similar lifespan. In South America, there are many cavity-using birds and mammals, including very colourful species such as toucans and parrots. In Argentina, about 80% of the nonexcavating cavity users nested in decay-formed cavities, despite the presence of many woodpecker species. This extensive use of decay-formed cavities was found in South America, Europe, Asia, and Australia. In contrast to North America, decay-formed cavities elsewhere persisted much longer than the woodpecker cavities. But decay is a very slow process. Trees can be 100 years old before decay processes are advanced enough to form cavities and are usually several centuries old before a number of suitable cavities are formed. Thus, wildlife species using decay-formed cavities are relying on large old living trees, but these valuable cavity trees are also targeted for harvest in South America and across much of the tropics. Kathy Martin's results suggest that excavating species may be able to ameliorate some impacts of tree harvest on cavity-using species

in North America, but that this approach will not work so well in other regions.

High quality cavities are limiting in almost all ecosystems and this research supports the need to ensure an ongoing supply of tree cavities for cavity-using wildlife. In North America, management for woodpecker friendly forests is required, and this involves retaining as much aspen as possible in a range of live and dead, mid-aged and older trees. The majority of cavity-using species live in South America and other continents, and here large old trees, in which decay- created cavities are found, need to be retained to support these complex wildlife communities.

of protection it deserves, the final part of a three-part boating regulation was enacted. The precedent-setting federal regulation restricts boats over 20 hp on the main channel of the upper Columbia River and its tributaries.

The boating regulation not only recognizes the ecological importance of the Columbia Wetlands, but also our community's perseverance and commitment to protecting our wild backyard.

As we head into nesting season in the wetlands, let's continue to be mindful of our impact in this sensitive ecosystem, remembering that aggressive behaviour from nonmotorized boaters can disturb nesting birds, and keep working together to protect wildlife, water and wild spaces in the Columbia Valley and beyond.

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
